If you are a UK Tax Payer, the Trust can reclaim the basic rate tax from HM Revenue & Customs (HMRC) on its 'gross' equivalent - the amount before basic rate tax was deducted. So if, for example, you gift aid your donation of £10, to the Trust it is worth £12.50. If you pay higher rate tax, you can claim the difference between the higher rate of tax (40%) and the basic rate of tax (20%) on the total (gross) value of your donation to the Trust. For example, if you donate £100, the total value of your donation to the Trust is £125 - so you can claim back 20% of this for yourself i.e., £25 if you pay tax at 40% or £37.50 if you pay tax at 50%.

Notes:

1. You can cancel this declaration at any time by notifying the Trust.
2. Please notify the Trust if you change your name or address.
3. You must pay an amount of income tax and/or capital gains tax at least equal to the tax that the Trust reclaims on your donations in the tax year.
4. If in the future if your circumstances change and you do not pay tax on your income and capital gains equal to the tax that the Trust reclaims, you can cancel your declaration.
5. If you pay tax at the higher rate you can claim further tax relief in your Self Assessment tax return.
